### Historical/Architectural


Phineas J. Kimball bought and annexed property to the growing town of Elgin in the mid 1800's, north of what is now Kimball St. and east of the Fox River. Out lot 1 of P.J. Kimball's Third Addition contained many lots and in the last quarter of the 19th century,, A.J. Waldron bought 5 of them to make "A.J. Waldron's Subdivision." 11 was bounded by Jefferson St. (then the north city limit) on the north, River St. (Grove Ave.) on the west and Brook St. on the east; in 1881 lot 3, on the corner of Brook and Jefferson was bought by Henry Muntz. By 1892, the north half of lot 3 was in the possession of Fred Miller (also spelled Müller), a carpenter who had built houses all over The 1894-95 city directory lists Fred Miller at 568 Brook St. and the 1897 Sanborn Map indicates a house at 568 Brook St. It is doubtful that Fred Miller actually lived at that address, owing to the fact that his name appears in numerous city directories, always at a different address each time. It is more likely that he was listed as the owner of record rather than the occupant. In 1897, Miller sold 568 Brook St. to Charles and Marietta Gardinier of Wauconda for \$3500--a substantial increase over Miller's paid price in 1892 of \$925. City directories list the house as either vacant or occupied by someone other than Gardinier until it was sold by Lucy Slocum, Charles Gardinier's heir, in 1908 to Leo Danner.

Leo Danner was in the beverage business, first soda pop, the as an agent for Anheuser-Busch (Budweiser, King of Beers) in the partnership of Danner&Markwardt. Danner lived at 253 Brook St. and the business was at the corner of Brook and Kimball. 568 Brook St. continued to be a rental until bought by Francis and Anthony Zenk, owners of the Zenk Brothers grocery at 620 Brook St. Zenk Bros. was well known in Elgin for having good meats. The house changed hands several more times until bought by its present owner.

#### Architectural

The house is quite simple and generally lacks ornamentation or "busy-ness" usually seen in Queen Annes; however, the house does contain the basic elements frequently found in Queen Anne's: a steeply pitched roof with front-facing gable and side gables; a small window in the roof peak, detail over all second floor windows, and the front door off to the side. These are common to the dozens of houses in Elgin built around the same time.

The front porch as it now exists is an expanded one when compared to the 1897 Sanborn Map. It is constructed of stone-faced block and has rounded porch supports in the classical style which appeared in the beginning of the 20th century. First floor windows have vertical panes in the upper sash, indicative of the 19teens or later
