Historical/Architectural

In 1890, a group of Elgin citizens formed the Elgin Improvement Company in an effort to draw businesses to Elgin, resulting in the Ludlow Shoe Factory and the Elgin Watch Case Company. Members of the company bought tracts of land in Elgin's north end in anticipation of workers needing housing close to their places of employment. Richard Botsford bought land along Dundee Avenue north of Slade Avenue and in 1891, annexed it to Elgin, naming it "R. N. Botsford's Addition to Elgin."

In 1902, Hugo Bedau bought lots 19 and 20 in block 4 of the Addition; later on, he had a house built on lot 20. Lot 19 remained open until 1926 when it was sold to Gertrude Secombe, wife of Elgin builder, Herbert Secombe. In April 1927, Herbert Secombe became indebted to McBride Lumber Company, likely to build a house on lot 19. The Elgin City Directory for 1925-26 has no listing for 1023 Bellevue Avenue; in the 1927-28 edition, 1023 Bellevue is occupied by Paul Heimann.

Heimann, along with relatives Tom and William Heimann, worked at the Selz-Schwab Shoe Factory, located in the former Ludlow Shoe Factory. Unfortunately, Selz-Schwab closed its doors immediately following the stock market crash in October 1929.

Paul Heimann's widow, Edith, married his brother John in 1963. Edith, widowed for a second time in 1981, continued to live at 1023 Bellevue Avenue until her passing in 1986. In 1987, after 60 years of ownership by the Heimann family, 1023 Bellevue was sold. The house had 3 more owners until bought by Dennis Roxworthy, well known rehabilitation/restoration expert in Elgin.

Architectural

Following World War 1, "The promotion of home ownership became a national mission." *The Chicago Bungalow*, Chicago Architecture Foundation, Dominic Pacyga & Charles Shanabruch, co-editors, p. 58 (2001). The 1920's signalled the end of the Victorian era and the end of the deprivation and sacrifice generated by the Great War. The decade was a time of prosperity and a building boom swept the country. "Own Your Own Home," was the theme of an exposition at the Chicago Coliseum in March 1925. Its aim was to promote home ownership. Elgin's contribution to "Own Your Own Home" was a booth promoting the advantages of living in Elgin. The *Elgin Daily Courier* for the month of March carried regular reports about the exposition and on March 27th, published the Souvenir Edition of *Live In Elgin* that was handed out to patrons at the expo. It contained photos and text of everything there was to know about the city. The last page of *Live In Elgin* emphasized "live really live...in Elgin, known the world over."

The Northeast Neighborhood: A Summary and Inventory, referring to two bungalows states "...and the frame house at 1023 Bellevue Avenue are fine examples of the Bungalow style." The Survey goes on to say "Bungalows are small in scale, making them ideal' starter homes' for the working class."

1023 Bellevue is listed as "significant" to the historic nature of the area. The house is unaltered. Craftsman elements seen on the 1 story house are the wide eaves, hipped roof with a hipped dormer containing a triple window grouping; 3 over 1 windows in groups of 2 or 3 in the south facade of the house, and additional 3 over 1 windows in the other facades.

UPRIGHT AND WING



270 Center Street

An Upright and Wing house combines a 2-story Gable Front section with a 1-, 1 1/2-, or 2-story section that meets at a right angle. These houses often lack ornamentation, but may have some applied ornament around door and windows. Between 1850 and 1929 there were 54 Upright and Wing houses built in the survey area. The house at 270 Center Street, dating from the 1870s, is an excellent example of an Upright and Wing house. Adding charm to the house is a ca.1903 classical-style wrap around porch.

BUNGALOW

The bungalow is an informal house type, first introduced in the United States as a vacation home, and popularized in California. Bungalows are small in scale, making them ideal "starter homes" for the working class. The term "bungalow" comes from a Bengali word,



635 Brook Street

"bangla." Bungalows are 1-, 1 1/2-, or 2-story houses that emphasize horizontality, and have broad and deep front porches and low-pitched roofs. They often have dormers, a rectangular plan, varying exterior materials, and built-in Arts and Crafts features on the interior.

The Bungalow style was very popular throughout the country after the turn of the century and is a prevalent style in Elgin. There are 193 Bungalows in the survey area dating from 1902 to 1936. Of these, 635 Brook Street, a brick Bungalow, and the frame house at 1023 Bellevue Avenue are fine examples of the Bungalow style.

Other significant bungalows are 1153 Bellevue Avenue, 701 and 713 Cedar Avenue, 602 and 608 Glenwood Avenue, 1120 Logan Avenue, 1121 Morton Avenue, and 386 Slade Avenue.



The George W. Ludlow Co., a major producer of shoes, moved from Chicago to Elgin in 1891, attracted by the offer of a new factory near the northeast corner of Congdon and Dundee avenues. Selz-Schwab bought the plant in 1897. This firm was producing up to 2,000 pairs of women's shoes daily before it closed in 1929.






The former shoe factory later housed the B. G. Garment Co. (women's dresses), a neon sign maker, Brody, Inc. (women's coats), and Tiny Tim, a miniature golf course. The State of Illinois operated a district highway sign shop in the building. In 1940 it employed six painters and four outside construction men. The unit produced and maintained more than 21,000 signs for the 1,500 miles of state primary roads in eight northern Illinois counties.

The Elgin Stove & Oven Co. produced gas ranges in a plant on North State Street between 1923 and 1931. The firm began making steel kitchen cabinets, which became the chief product line, in 1927. Production ended in 1957.


