Historical/Architectural

In 1890, a group of Elgin citizens formed the Elgin Improvement Company in an effort to draw businesses to Elgin. They concentrated their efforts in Elgin's northeast end, resulting in the Ludlow Shoe Factory and the Elgin Watch Case Company. Duncan Avenue is named for Thomas Duncan who held a high position at the Watch Case Company.

Members of the Elgin Improvement Company bought tracts of land in Elgin's north end in anticipation of workers needing housing close to their places of employment. Richard Botsford, a member of EIC, bought land along Dundee Avenue north of Slade Avenue and in 1891, annexed it to Elgin naming it "R.N. Botsford's Addition."

Block 4 of Botsford's Addition was bounded by Cooper, Bellevue, Congdon, and Duncan Avenues. In 1918, William Grote, a trustee of the EIC, sold lot 22 to Charles Pease. Pease lived in Champaign, Illinois and sold lot 22 to Helen and Charles Stebbins, residents of Carpentersville, in 1926.

The 1920's signalled the end of the Victorian era and the end of the deprivation and sacrifice generated by the Great War. The decade was a time of prosperity and a building boom swept the country. "Own Your Home" was the theme of an exposition at the Chicago Coliseum in March 1925. Its aim was to promote home ownership. Elgin's contribution to "Own Your Home" was a booth promoting the advantages of living in Elgin. The *Elgin Daily Courier* for the month of March carried regular reports about the exposition and on March 27th, published the Souvenir Edition of *Live In Elgin* that was handed out to patrons at the expo. It contained photos and text of everything there was to know about the city. The last page of *Live In Elgin* emphasized "live really live...in Elgin, known the world over."

The 1929-30 *Elgin City Directory* has no listing for 1039 Bellevue Avenue (lot 22); the 1931-32 edition lists John Collins at 1039. City directories at that time used an * to denote owners--Collins has no *, indicating he was a renter.

Charles Stebbins was the pastor of the First Congregational Church in Carpentersville from 1920 until his passing in 1938. He was ordained in 1901 and was pastor at churches in Ohio and Illinois. Rev. Stebbins was from New York state where he had served in the National Guard. During WW1, he was the director of the American Red Cross at Camp Grant. His obituary in the *Elgin Daily Courier-News*, June 18, 1938, states, "he had been one of the recognized leaders in Protestant church circles in this part of the state." Besides his involvement in the Congregational Church, Rev. Stebbins held office in Masonic lodges in Illinois.

Under Stebbins' ownership, 1039 Bellevue remained a rental until 1944 when it was acquired by Libbie Caldwell. Mrs. Caldwell was a daughter of the Kenyon family who lived west of Elgin. Two of her brothers were builders who constructed many homes on Elgin's west side. Mrs. Caldwell was a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and active in the Elgin chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star, a Masonic organization. Mrs. Caldwell died in 1955.

1039 Bellevue exchanged hands three more times until 1960 when it was sold to Jacob and Anna Glotzer. Jacob Glotzer was a psychologist at Elgin Mental Health Center for many years. Following Anna Glotzer's passing in 1990, the executor of her estate sold the house in 1991.

Over the next thirteen years, the house had two sets of owners who each went through

a divorce and foreclosure. In 2004, 1039 Bellevue was acquired by Dennis Roxworthy, well known Elgin house restorationist.

Architectural

Historic Resources in the Northeast Neighborhood: A Summary and Inventory lists 1039 Bellevue as an unaltered bungalow that contributes to the historic significance of the area. It further states "the bungalow is an informal house type...small in scale, making them ideal 'starter homes' for the working class."

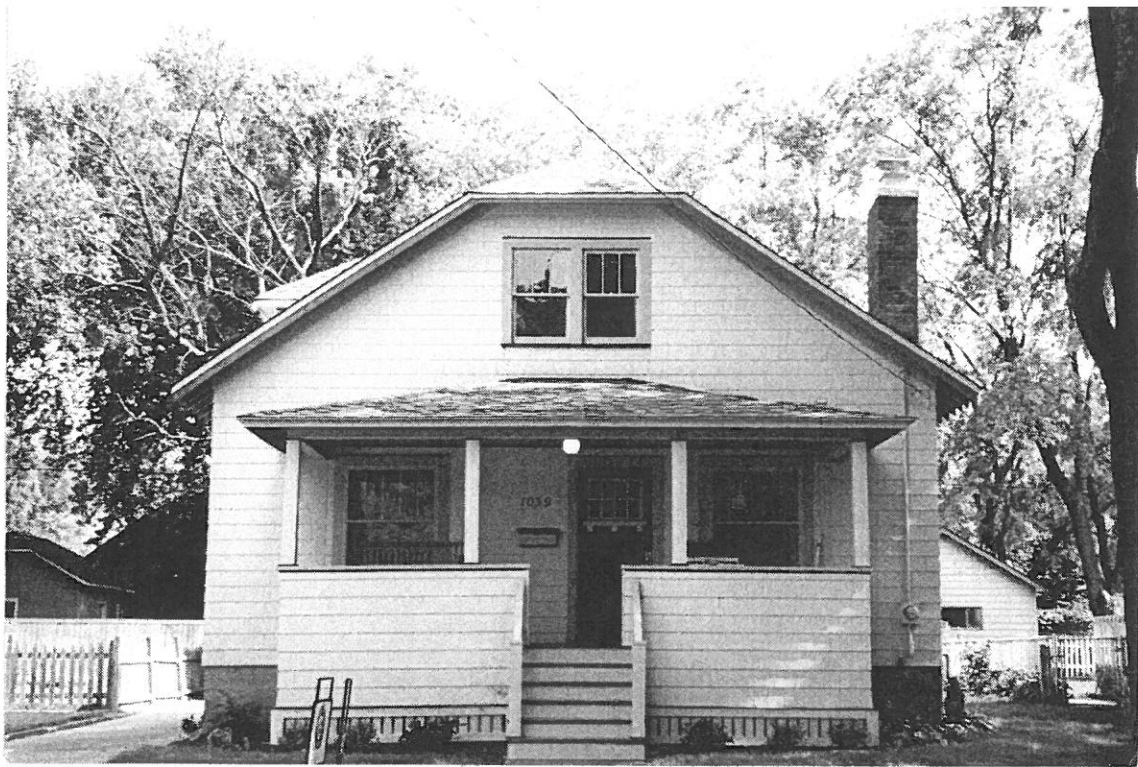
Elements of the bungalow style are a low pitched gabled roof; exposed roof rafters; porches; and a rectangular plan. 1039 is a dollhouse delight in its size and simplicity. It is 1 1/2 stories with a 1 story front porch and sits the long way on a the deep lot. It is distinguished by its jerkin head roof--a front gabled roof with the peak flattened. The front eaves are enclosed while the side eaves are open, exposing the rafter ends.

Windows are multiple vertical panes over a single pane- typical 1920's style. They are seen as a large single window in the front facade, in paired sets on the north facade, and singly in the south facade.

Craftsman elements noted are the exposed rafter ends and the outside red brick fireplace chimney. Color has been used to further distinguish the house, transforming it from plain to eyecatching.

According to city of Elgin building permits, the garage was built in 1938 and the north side dormer added in 1964.

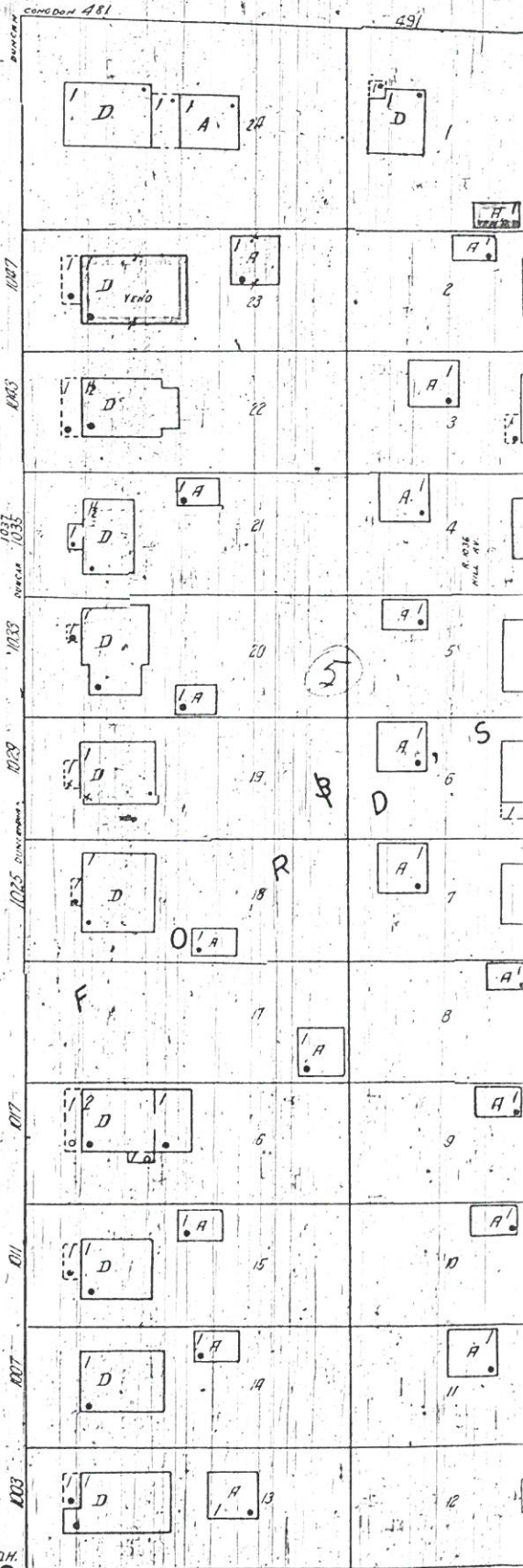
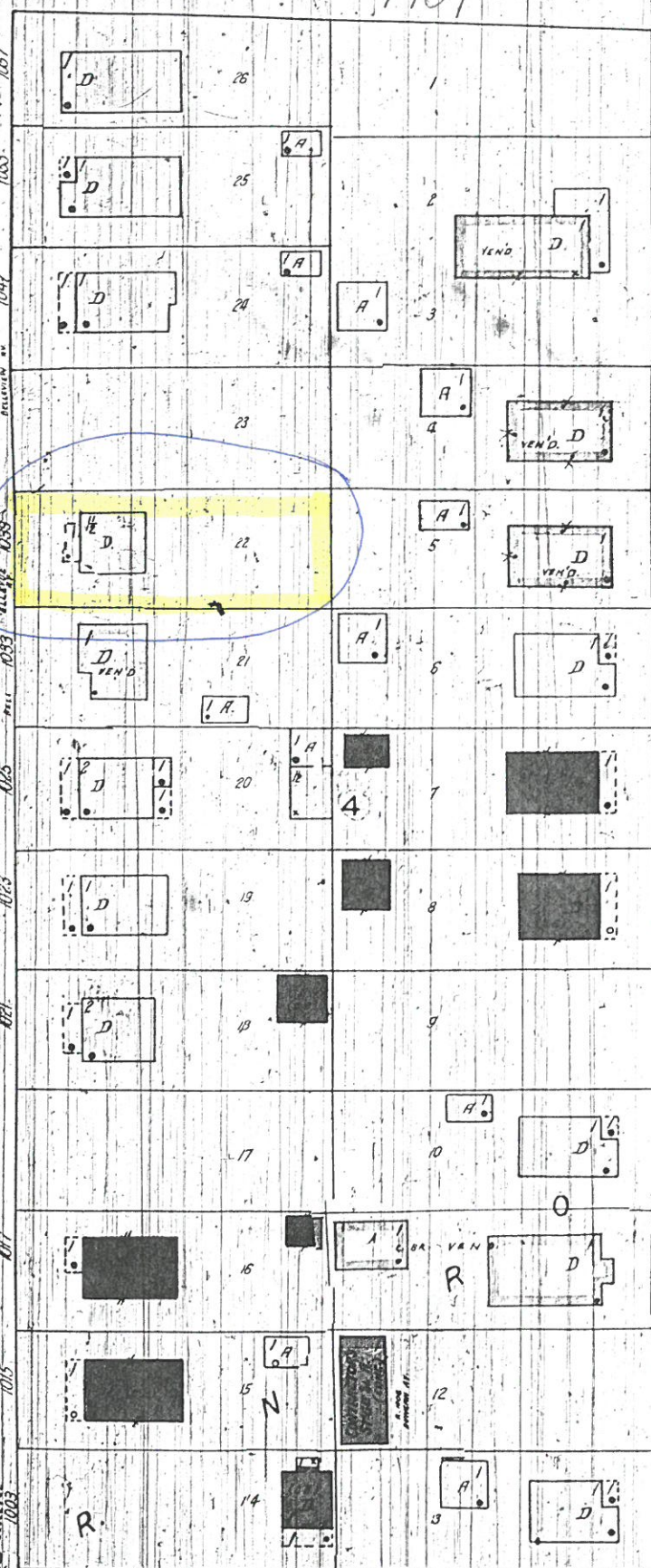
Sanborn Map 1939

Business, on a petition of L. H. Finley; reclassification of a tract on the north side of route 20 east of Udiha triangle from B-1 District Business and F-District Farming to B-3 District Business. The petitioner was Sidney Burnidge.

The petition of the Valley Improvement Co. for a change in zoning from F-District Farming to I-District Industrial for a tract of land about 500 feet square a quarter of a mile south of Indian Trall was also approved, as was a petition by Martin R. Boor for a change from F-Farming to B-3 Business for a tract on the east side of route 47 approximately three miles north of Lily Lake.

Deny One Petition

Board members concurred with the zoning commission in denying the petition of Carl and Henry Silva for a reclassification of a tract on the west side of route 25, south of route 62 from F-Farming to B-1 District Business.

Payment of \$435.50 to registrars in several Kane county communities for the compilation of vital statistics was also authorized.

Because the county treasurer is also ex officio member of the county tax assessing body, it was agreed that a separate bond should be set to cover this additional job. The figure of \$2000 was approved, with the premiums to be paid by the county.

Name Two Delegates

Arthur Zimbleman of Aurora, and Charles E. Flora of Elgin, were named as delegates to the Illinois County Officials convention in Chicago, May 5-6-7. Chairman Rauscher will also be a delegate.

Just prior to adjournment, Supervisor Charles A. Keslinger voiced the opinion that the present mileage rate for supervisors—ten cents per mile—was too high, stating that eight cents would have been a fairer figure. In this he was supported by several other supervisors, including Sydney L. Perkins.

Hopes For Cooperation

Rauscher, upon accepting the chairmanship, said he sincerely appreciated the confidence placed in him. He assured the board he would do everything possible to make a success of the job. Expressing the hope of full cooperation from all members, Rauscher said "We must work together for the welfare of all Kane county." The new chairman was former-

President's Son And Anne Clark Wed

Simple Rites In Ancient Church At Nahant, Massachusetts

NAHANT, Mass. — (AP) — In the simple but sonorous single-ring Episcopal ceremony, John Roosevelt and Anne Lindsay Clark were married at 10 (CST) this morning in an ancient church close by the sea. While the President and Mrs. Roosevelt watched from a front-row, a few feet from the flower-bowered, white satin-covered altar, John and Anne took the vows that removed the last bachelor from the Roosevelt family and gave the Clark family its first married daughter.

Throng of Well-Wishers.

The two youngsters, both within a few months of their twenty-second birthdays, were given the happy auguries of a warm, sunny day. A throng of well-wishers filled to the doors the 107-year-old union church and thousands pressed against the police lines outside. The bride, wearing a flowing white organdie gown embroidered with 620 yards of satin ribbon, and a tulle veil and train that required 10 yards of material, swept up the left-hand aisle of the tiny church on the arm of her uncle, Russell Sturgis.

Before the strains of the Lohengrin wedding march had died, John joined her before the altar, stepping from the cramped, red-carpeted robing room to the right of the chancel. Behind him, as supporter in the bridegroom's traditional hour of discomfort, stood his brother and best man, Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr.

Have 13 Ushers.

Among the 13 ushers—a good luck omen rather than bad, John held—were his two other brothers, while with the bridesmaids stood his one sister, Mrs. Anna Roosevelt Boettiger, colorful in a gown of hyacinth blue net, poke bonnet of natural straw and big bouquet.

The marriage ceremonies were performed by the Right Rev. Henry Knox Sherill, Episcopal bishop of Massachusetts, and the Rev. Endicott Peabody, 81-year-old headmaster of Groton school, who has taught all the Roosevelt boys and officiated at their marriages as well.

The bridal couple was played out of the church up the right, red-carpeted aisle—missing the traditional center aisle only because the church has none—by the strains of the Mendelssohn wedding march.

Prominent Persons There.

Run Down As He Fails To Hear Signal

Clarence Harvey, 14, Victim Of Tragedy At Woodstock

Clarence Harvey, 14 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. True Harvey, 468 E. Lake st., Woodstock, was killed at 6:45 last night when he was struck by a Chicago & North Western passenger train as he walked along the northbound tracks near the South street viaduct in Woodstock.

The boy's body was ground to bits beneath the wheels of the train and was identified only by a ring which he was wearing.

Coroner E. H. Cook of Huntley held an inquest at Pierce & Sons funeral chapel in Woodstock this morning and the jury found that the boy came to his death accidentally.

Clarence carried a sandwich sign advertising last night's show at the Woodstock theater yesterday afternoon and earned a pass to the performance. After he finished supper last night, he left for the show, taking his usual route along the railroad tracks.

Signal Is Unheeded.

William Bartley of Harvard, engineer on the train, which was northbound and which was slowing up to make a stop at the Woodstock depot four blocks from where the accident occurred, testified this morning that he saw Clarence between the rails when the train was about five car lengths away.

Bartley said that he grabbed the whistle cord and held it down. He testified that the boy apparently was in deep thought as he never looked up. His body was rolled beneath the wheels of the locomotive and cars and he was killed outright.

When Harold Kemerling, police marshal, reached the scene, he was unable to find the body. Finally pieces of it were discovered along the railroad right-of-way. Marshal Kemerling found a hand which bore a signet ring and it was this clue that led to the identification of the boy.

Born In Kankakee.

Other witnesses who testified at the inquest in addition to the engineer and police marshal were Thomas King of Harvard, fireman, and Charles Wheaton of Harvard, conductor.

Clarence was born in Kankakee, Ill., Oct. 4, 1923. In addition to his parents, he is survived by five sisters, Barbara, Marlene, Evelyn, Anna, and Gloria, and a brother, Arnold.

Funeral arrangements are incomplete, although services probably will be held Sunday afternoon at the residence with burial at Woodstock.
