Historical/Architectural

David C. Cook moved his non-denominational religious literature publishing business to Elgin from Chicago in 1882. Cook was a savvy businessman and the company prospered.

By the turn of the century, Cook Publishing had outgrown the building located near the Fox River on Chicago Street. Cook began looking around Elgin for enough land to accomodate a large publishing plant. Edward C. Lovell, aware of Cook's quest, had the ideal place in mind. The land was open, along a railroad line, and in a part of Elgin that needed a boost. He offered to donate five acres of land in Elgin's north end for the plant and offered the remaining acreage needed at reasonable terms. The land offered for the new and expanded publishing plant was in the 160 acre tract of land owned by the heirs of Lucy Lovell. The land was originally acquired by Vincent and Lucy Lovell in the 1840s and was passed along to their sons and their subsequent heirs. The deal was made with the transaction occurring on December 31, 1900.

For the publishing company, Cook acquired property running from Lincoln to Slade Avenues and from River Street (now N. Grove Avenue) to the right of way of the CNWRR track that ran parallel to the river. As a private individual, he acquired property across the street, from Lincoln Avenue to Slade Avenue and platted "David C. Cook's Addition" in 1901. The Addition had a park in the center, Esmeralda Park, with entry drives on all four sides across from the offices of Cook Publishing and was used for residences.

In 1904, Cook added to his previous property acquisitions when he bought "all the land west of Brook Street...to the right of way of the railroad and lying north of Slade..." The east boundary was an alley on the east side of Brook Street and the south boundary was Slade Avenue. The north boundary contained one lot on the north side of River Bluff Road where said road and the alley meet. The land was separated from the Fox River by the Chicago and Northwestern Railway on its west boundary.

DeGoy Ellis was a "leader in the political, civic, and social life" of Elgin, as stated in his obituary January 19, 1949. He was an attorney for 50 years, serving as city attorney for Elgin, serving in the state legislature, and in local and federal courts of equity. He was a partner in Irving Western's law firm and later in his own law firm of Ellis, Hamilton, and Geister. His specialty was probate work and he had handled the estate of David C. Cook. It appears that Western, Ellis, Daniel Weed, and others formed a group of investors with interest in the 1904 property.

In 1926, Ellis and Daniel Weed, treasurer for Cook Publishing Company, were owners of the property Cook had bought in 1904. Perhaps taking advantage of the building boom sweeping the United States at the time, Ellis and Weed had the property platted as "Home In The Woods" subdivision, a housing tract unique to Elgin at the time. Its primary uniqueness lay in its design. Other additions and subdivisions followed a straight-line streets grid format. HOMWD's* "main street" was an extension of N. Grove Avenue; however, once N. Grove crossed Slade Avenue, it became River Bluff Road, fittingly named since it followed the contour of the land and river, running in a northeasterly direction. At its confluence with the straight-line Brook Street and Cooper Avenue, a rounded piece of land was set aside as a park. Lots 6 and 7 to the east of the park and lot 37 to the north of the park were similarly rounded.

HOMWD contained 43 lots, all of which were subject to building restrictions- a new

embellishment to land development. It appears that the focus of the building restrictions was to ensure property values by establishing building lines (distance from the street), type and cost of buildings (residences costing at least \$8,000 and private garages and no "flats"), where the garages were to be (at the rear of the residence and not used for a residence). Five lots were designated for "flats" and apartments, or industrial and commercial pursuits, but nothing clamorous, offensive, or noxious. Said lots were on the far north and south reaches of HOMWD and would likely cause little annoyance to the remainder of the subdivision. The building restrictions were to be in effect until June 1940.

One of the first houses built in HOMWD was at 50 River Bluff Road for DeGoy Ellis, about 1929. It is thought that perhaps the house was designed by architect R. Harold Zook since it contains numerous elements of his design style. No documentation has been found to confirm that. The house was designated "Oakhurst" by the Ellis's. Others who built homes in that area of River Bluff Road were David C. Cook III at 32, Dr. Lloyd Blackman at 33 and named "Oakknoll," Adolph Bernstein at 38, Jerome Roth at 45 (the former park), and Earl Seagren at 56. These homes likely were built on the choicest lots in HOMWD and brought a certain cache to that section of the street. Home In The Woods is a pleasant surprise as one approaches from the northern reaches of River Bluff Road--a dip in the roadway and a curve to the west leads one along the bluff above the river and past the homes aforementioned. A feature of HOMWD not seen in other residential areas is a streetlamp posted at determined distances within its borders. A lamp sits atop a slender concrete pole; the lamps are no longer functional and were a later addition to HOMWD. One can sense and visually determine that this is someplace different.

On the south end of River Bluff Road, closer to Slade Avenue, home building did not occur until the early 1950's, when post-war building increased. The 1950's Ranch house style was popular and these were built at 17, 16, 9, 8, 4, and 3 between 1952 and 1961. Lot 39 adjoined lots 28 and 29 to the west up to the railroad right of way and was owned by someone else. Lot 39 was one of the lots designated for flats, apartments, or commercial use in the original building restrictions. No flats, apartments, or commercial pursuits were built in HOMWD.

In 1930, An inventory of the estate of Irving Western included an undivided half-interest in numerous unsold lots in HOMWD. His heir, wife Beulah, gave up her interest in the property to Ellis and Weed and by 1932, Weed was the sole owner of lot 9-along Brook Street, near Cooper Avenue. The Great Depression was climbing to its zenith and Weed mortgaged the property. In 1937, as the Depression began lifting, Weed sold lot 9 to August Hameister. Newspapers for 1937 again listed construction reviews in increasing number, offering reassurance to a shell-shocked nation that things were getting better. The Elgin city Directory for 1937-38 has no listing for §37 Brook Street. It first appears in the 1939 edition with August H. Hameister as the owner.

August H. Hameister was a production manager at the D.C. Cook Publishing Company, retiring in 1946. He and his wife Hannah, children Carolyn, Glenn, and Richard then moved to 64 Lovell Street. Hameister remained in the publishing business, working at Hall Printing Company.

Hameister kept the house only nine years, selling it to Marshall Silbert in 1946. Silbert operated his own business related to items made at the Watch Factory. Silbert kept the house until 1964. There followed five more owners until bought by the present owner in 1998.

The house was featured on the 2008 Historic Elgin House Tour.

Architectural

Colonial Revival, Prairie, Craftsman, and Tudor were but a few styles of the Eclectic Movement in architectural design. They differed from Victorian era styles with a return to simplicity and greater adherence to classical designs of European origin. WW 1 marked a turning point for the movement when construction technology made it possible to apply masonry veneer to wood framing, making classical styles more affordable and thus, more common.

Colonial Revival style houses feature a centered front entry with detail, paired or multiple windows symmetrically placed in facades, and brick as the most common wall cladding. The style most closely compares to the English influence on houses constructed in the early years of America's settlement; e.g., Adam and Georgian style houses of the 1700s.

Improved printing methods helped popularize the style through the publishing of photos along with text in books and periodicals. Houses built between 1915 and 1935 reflect the use of photos that made examples of the style available; they more readily mimic early Colonial houses with their side gabled roofs and simplicity of detail. Salient features of Colonial Revival houses is the focus on the front entry, balanced use of windows with numerous panes, and a centered door.

937 Brook Street is listed in *The Northeast Neighborhood: A Summary and Inventory* as contributing to the historical and architectural significance of the area. The section of HOMWD along Brook Street from Slade Avenue to Cooper Avenue contains a number of Colonial Revival homes.

937 is side gabled, clad in brick, and is two storied with a later addition, similarly clad in masonry though not the dark brick, on its south facade. The west or front facade has a centered front entry door that opens onto a concrete stoop. There is no roof over the entry and the decoration surrounding the door is flat: a triangular pediment, pilasters on either side of the door, and a half-circle window over the door.

Windows throughout the house are multi-paned over a single pane. In the front facade, there are five windows in the upper story over four windows and the front door in the lower story. A quarter-circle window is used on either side of the exterior of the chimney on the south facade.

The addition, appearing to have been put on in the '50s, has the same side gabled roof, windows, and eave lines as the main body of the original house, complementing it nicely. The chimney has light color stone used as decoration as well as the quarter-round windows. Another chimney rises out of the addition.

A one story section projects out from the rear of the house and has a flat roof.


