Irregularity when he rule. Wings and gables protruded in all directions. Balconies, overhanging gables, and bay windows dotted the facade. Towers and turrets were common. Small garret windows crop out of the roof. Roofs were usually steeped, giving the house a tall proportion. Trim and ornament were lavish. Note the finial on the turret here.


Although Queen Anne houses are now often painted white, when new they were adorned in two or three deep colors—redbrown, deep green, umber, ochre, maroon, and burnt orange—to emphasize the decoration. The restoration of No. 18 Warwick is a good example of this use of color.

TURN RIGHT AT E. CHICAGO 503 East Chicago

Erected in 1883, this was the home of Charles Marckhoff, one of four brothers who came from Germany to form a brick and stone work contracting firm.

Intersection with Porter

Porter Street was named after Aaron Porter, a Gifford brotherin-law, who once had a claim in this vicinity.

552 East Chicago

There is a north European look to this house, perhaps because it was built in 1891 for Christian Wuestenfeld, a German-born electrical expert. While working for Thomas A. Edison, he is said to have trimmed the first electrically lighted Christmas tree. He came to Elgin to install the power plant and distribution system for the streetcar line.


558, 564 and 570 East Chicago

Leading officials of the Elgin National Watch Co., each born in New England, once lived in these three houses. No. 558 was built in 1890 for E. F. Gooding, foreman of the balance department, 1868-1913. Smith Hoag designed the Queen Anne at No. 564 for Hiram S. Thomas,

foreman of the plate department, 1868-1909. It we also erected in 1890. No. 570, completed in 1891, was later occupied by William A. Gabriel, chief designer for more than forty years.

600 East Chicago

Erected in 1892, this is an example of the SHINGLE style. The waits have a uniform covering of shingles which contrast with the sweeping rough stone veranda railing. The round tower and round arched side windows were common features. The effect is simpler and more subdued than the Queen Anne style. The peak on the tower was called a witch's cap.



The Richardsons' electric, 1900

The home was built for George B. Richardson, production superintendent for the David C. Cook Publishing Co., who bought Elgin's first individually owned automobile in 1900. It was a Waverly electric that could be driven thirty miles after a charge.

Across the street is a modern apartment complex that was once the site of the home of William Hintze, president of the Elgin Butter Co. Its huge barn, erected in 1887, is still standing and can be viewed from Porter Street.

TURN LEFT AT NORTH LIBERTY

Liberty Street may refer to the Liberty party, which opposed the extension of slavery into the territories. Local elections in 1847 gave
