Architecture: Queen Anne Victorian with free classic details built 1891

Evidence of house being built 1891:

- September 6, 1890 - Deed selling property to Granville T. Veazie, \$500¹
- June 1891 - Elgin City Directory 1890 - 91 listed Granville T. Veazie boarding at 288 Summit²
- December 19, 1891 - Review of Construction - house on Highland built for Veazie by the Hayward Brothers³
- June 1892 - Elgin City Directory 1892 listed Granville T. Veazie with a house at 371 Highland⁴
- 1892 Atlas contains house on property⁵
- December 31, 1892 - Elgin Daily Courier Review of Construction only includes a house on Aldine built by the Haywards for G. T. Veazie⁶
- March 15, 1896 - Deed selling property to Emma Bishop \$3500⁷

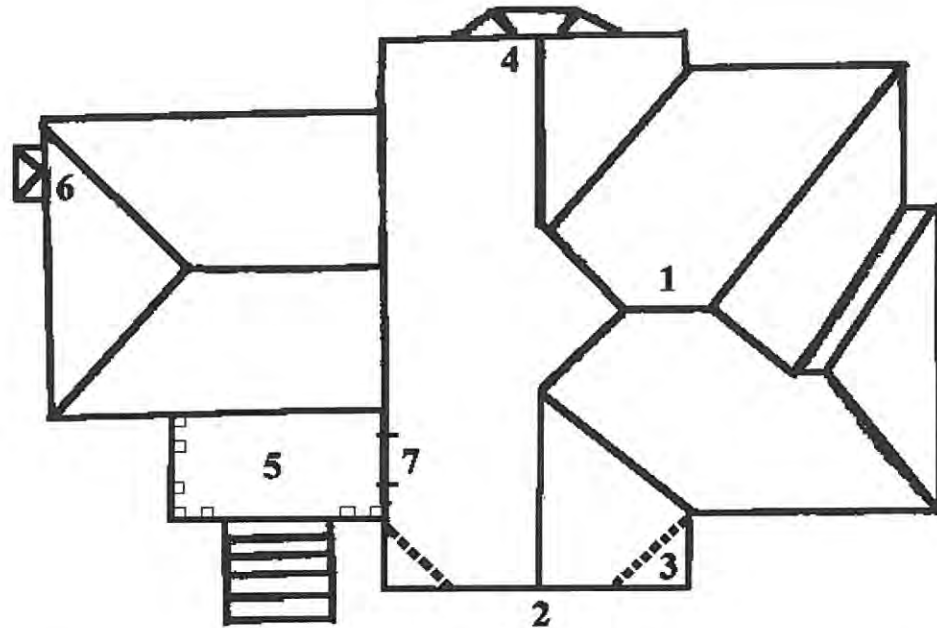
Style/Architectural features:

House categorized as an example of a Queen Anne with Free Classic details.
The diagram below illustrates some of the reasons:



1. Steeply pitched, hipped roof with irregular shape (1 marks highest point)
2. Dominant front facing gable decorated with variegated square coursed and fishscale wood shingles
3. Cut away bay window on first story
4. Rear facing gable with same wood shingle decorations, and first story bay window projecting out from wall
5. Partial, asymmetrical, one story porch with a flat roof, and three groupings of square pillars (groups of 2-3 pillars -- free classic style)
6. Single story wing with hipped roof and projection covering back entry
7. Main entrance

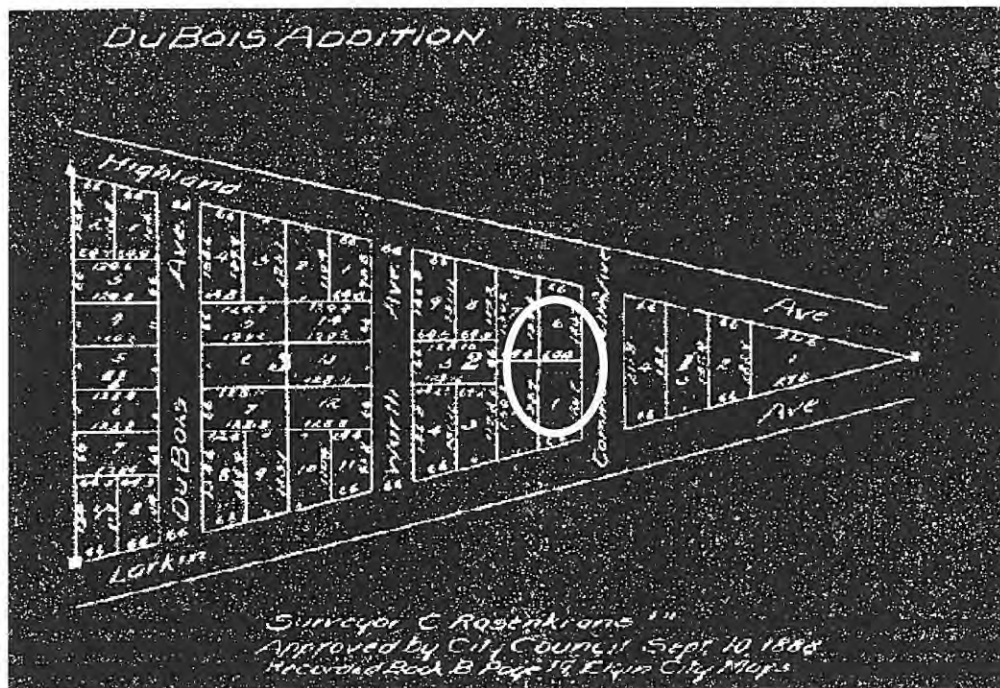
Location: DuBois Addition, Block 2, Lot 6

DuBois Addition

Lot 6, Block 2 of the DuBois Addition was approved by City Council September 10, 1888, and recorded Book B, Page 19, Elgin City Maps⁸. Surveyor G. Rosenkrans laid out the subdivision for Louisa DuBois, widow, Matthew Wygant DuBois, unmarried, Mary L. Richards and William F. Richards, her husband, Susan Amanda Swan and Theodore F. Swan, her husband, and Julia A. Chapman and Albert A. Chapman, her husband.

Highland Avenue borders the subdivision to the north and Larkin Avenue borders it to the south. The addition was adjacent to Wm. H. Wing's land to the north, bordered Creighton and Wilcox land to the south and DuBois land to the west. DuBois Addition forms a distinctive triangle with the point where Highland and Larkin intersect. The September 17, 1888 Plat Map indicates the boundaries were marked by monumental stones at the three corners of the subdivision (today the only evidence of these markers is a patch of concrete that may have supported the monumental stone at the main point). Subdivision intersected by Commonwealth, Worth, and DuBois Avenues.

Historical Significance: Builders, Owners & Residents

Builders:

The Hayward Brothers, James P. & Stevens, contractors and builders that resided at 303 N. Worth in 1894-95, built the house.¹² A review of the Construction Reviews in the Elgin Daily Courier provides proof of the significant number of houses that were built by the Haywards. The following is a summary of the houses built:

First Owners: Granville T. & Cornelia A. Veazie

Granville T. Veazie held a very strong connection to the Hayward Brothers (303 N. Worth - 1894-95 City Directory), the builders of the house. The list above contains his name more than any other. Granville T. Veazie purchased the lot September 6, 1890, as posted in Document # 32219, Book 290, Page 598. It is interesting to note that Page 599 contained a deed for a house being sold by Veazie (based on price it obviously contained a house, whereas the deed for our lot was for \$500). City Directories listed Granville T. Veazie as a lather. The deed posted when Granville T. Veazie sold the property for \$3500 to Emma Bishop on March 15, 1896 contains the first reference to Cornelia A. Veazie, his wife.

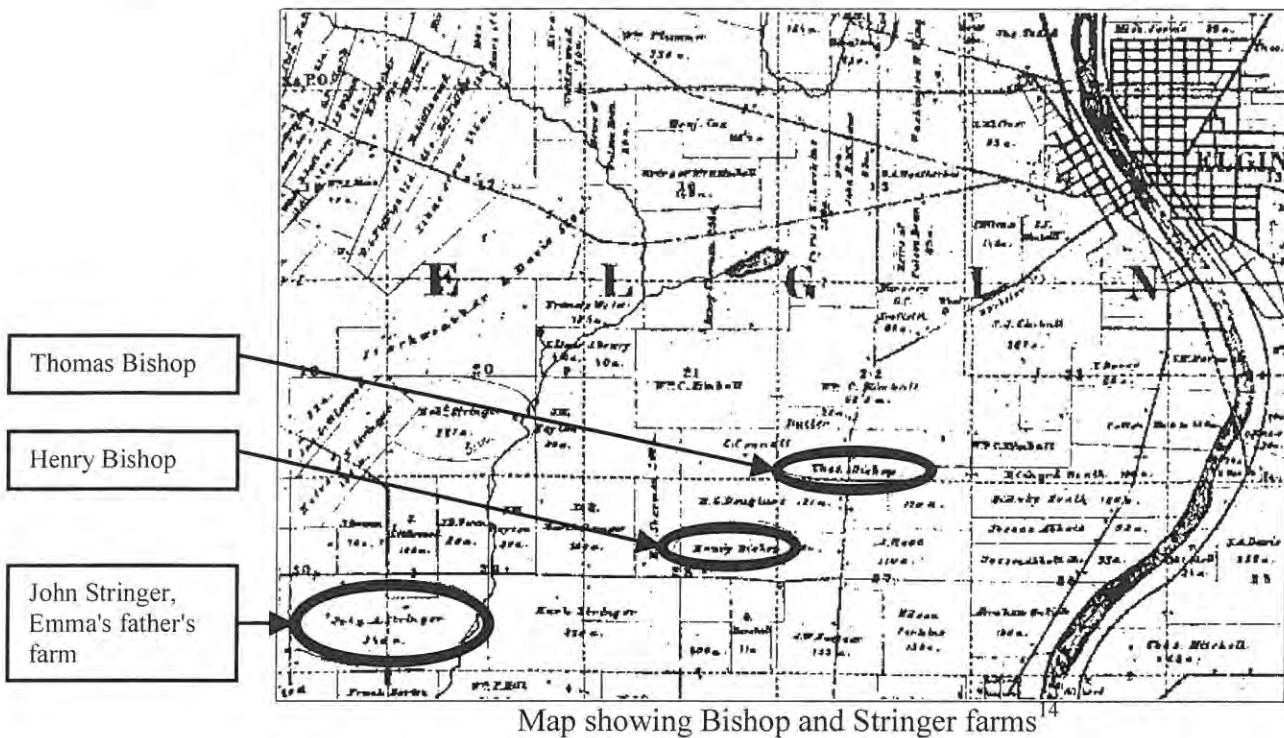
Second Owner: Emma Bishop

Emma Bishop was born Emma Stringer in Kane County, March 19, 1848. She was the daughter of John A. and Ann (Sterricker) Stringer. Her father was born in Devonshire, England and came to Kane County in September 1845. He acquired 340 acres of land on Section 29, Elgin Township. He started as a grain farmer, but later became interested in dairy farming.

Emma married Thomas Bishop, and together they had six children, Clarence, Florence, his twin sister who died at the age of 6 months, Birdie, Wilbur and Walter, who were living with their mother in 1898 according to the Biographical Record (2 years after Emma purchased the house).¹³

Thomas Bishop was born in Devonshire England, September 12, 1890. His family moved to Quebec, Canada when he was 8 years old, and he completed his education there. He became interested in a business career in the lumber industry and served as a captain in the militia. Upon his mother's death, his father and 4 sons moved to Kane County, where the 4 sons worked as farm hands; Thomas and one brother on a farm on Section 22 and Henry and the other brother on a farm on Section 28.

Thomas build a residence on the farm on Section 22 (2 miles SW of Elgin) after becoming the owner. The present residence erected in 1856. He placed his land under a high state of cultivation until the well-tilled fields yielded one of the best-improved farms in the county. He was a man of broad capabilities:

- Organizer and a director of the Home National Bank since 1874
- Stockholder in the Elgin Canning Co.
- School director
- Road commissioner for 14 years, and filled office of Supervisor for 8 years
- Member of the Universalist church
- Member of the Republican Party

Thomas Bishop passed away suddenly on October 4, 1891 (4 years prior to Emma's purchase of the house). He passed quickly and quietly on his farm. He insisted on milking cows with his son Clarence. He milked two cows and poured out the milk when Clarence noticed something was wrong. Thomas Bishop passed away in his son's arms at 4:30. Thomas was buried in the old Elgin cemetery.¹⁵

Clarence Bishop, Emma's eldest son, born March 6, 1870 was educated in the district schools supplemented by study in the Elgin Academy and Drew's Business College. At 18, he put aside his studies and became his father's assistant on the farm. He continued his work until his father's death. He then operated the farm for his mother until his marriage, in 1895 (1 year before Emma purchased the house). He then leased the property from the estate. He married Emma L. Schumacher the daughter of Reverend Henry Schumacher, minister of the Evangelical Church. Clarence was a trustee of the Universalist Church, a school trustee, a member of the Lincoln Republican Club of Elgin, and was a delegate to the State Republican Convention in Springfield.

Birdie Bishop was married on April 24, 1895 (1 year prior to Emma purchasing the house) to A. Merton Smythe at the residence of her mother. The Elgin Daily Courier¹⁶ said Birdie was a well-known young lady with a wide circle of friends, and the groom is a prosperous businessman, a member of the jewelry firm of Smythe & Lawrence. Interestingly, John F. Lawrence also married on the same day as Birdie.

The Biographical Record of Kane County, published in 1898 (2 years after Emma purchased the house) stated within Thomas' profile that the youngest sons, Wilbur and Walter, were living in Elgin with their mother, Emma. This corresponds with the size of the house - 3 bedrooms. The Elgin Advocate on September 8, 1906 announced the birth of a daughter to Wilbur and his wife, formerly Miss Imogene Ross.

Third Owner: Lewis A. Baker

Lewis A. Baker, who became the manager of the Elgin Manufacturing Company, purchased the house on July 5, 1912¹⁷. He and his wife, Sue P. Baker, resided at 856 Highland Avenue (clearly visible from our house's front porch); built in 1893 and pictured in the 1893 Review of Construction. It documented that the house was not built under contract, but was erected by day work supervised by Mr. Baker. The foundation and ornamental work of rough boulders gave a pretty effect. It was finished with hard wood, heated with steam, and was in every respect modern. Built at a cost of \$5300.¹⁸

On May 21, 1901, Lewis Baker's daughter, Lillian, was married to Mr. Lee Duer of Cleveland, Ohio at the home of the bride's father and mother in the presence of 150 guests. Dr. A. K. de Blois performed the ceremony at noon with the principals standing in front of the house's bay windows. As they left their parent's home, they would have been able to clearly see the house they would reside in 14 years later. The groom was employed as a bookkeeper for Lewis Baker at the Elgin Manufacturing Company.¹⁹ The Elgin Advocate cited Lillian as one of Elgin's younger society belles.²⁰

The 1915 City Directory listed Lee and Lillian Duer residing at 907 Highland Avenue. Lee was at that time the Secretary of the Elgin Manufacturing Company, and by 1923 he was listed as the President. They resided at the house until it was sold to Marion R. Healy in 1926.²¹ The 1927-28 City Directory listed them as residing in the Baker house at 856 Highland, where they stayed until being listed at R.R. 4 Elgin in the 1941-42 City Directory.

Other Notable Owners and Residents:

- In 1935-36 City Directory, the resident of the house was Leslie & Gladys Scheele. Leslie was then the Vice President of the August Scheele Company, a grocery at 100-106 Douglas.
- From 1941 through 1950, Aaron & Lina Kline lived in the house. Aaron was the proprietor (later listed as the Owner/Partner) of Kline Brother's Department Store at 70-72 Grove.

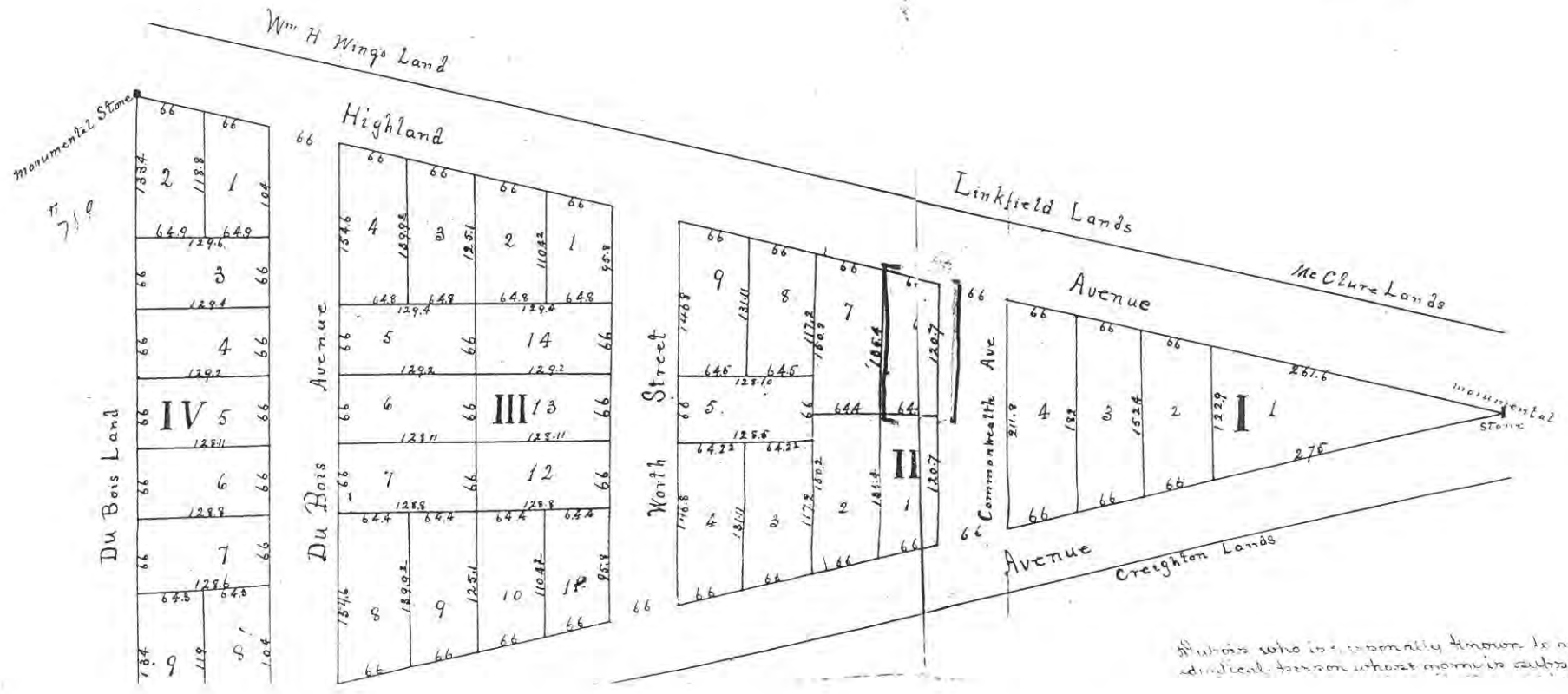

Mrs. Harvey, four sons died in infancy. The others are as follows: Charles M. enlisted in the Seventh Illinois Infantry, under the first call for three-months' men, and after the expiration of his term re-enlisted in the Plato Cavalry, his company being first assigned to the Thirty-sixth Illinois Volunteer Infantry, and later to the Fifteenth Illinois Cavalry, serving as first lieutenant of Company B. Re-enlisting again as a veteran, he served until the close of the war. He was with Sherman's army on the celebrated march from Atlanta to the sea, and was once slightly wounded while carrying dispatches. He married Clara E. Conger and lived in Waco, Texas, at which place he and his wife and daughter all died. Welford W. makes his home on a ranch near Buffalo, in Wyoming. He married Mrs. Mary E. Orr, by whom he has one son, Ray Phelps, and she has two daughters by her former marriage—Minnie and Nellis. Cecil C. was formerly a successful teacher for a number of years, but for the past fourteen years has been librarian of the city library of Elgin. Mary E. is also at home. Estelle E. is the wife of William Freck, a machinist and inventor living in Chicago, and they have three children—Florence, Howard B. and Margaret Loraine. Illione is a writer in an insurance office in Chicago. The wife and mother passed away September 19, 1895, when almost seventy-eight years of age. She was a member of the Universalist church, which her husband also attends.

With Mr. Harvey resides his aunt, Mrs. Emily (Harvey) Ainsworth, who in 1843 came to McHenry county, Illinois, but later spent a short time in Missouri. On her return to this state she located in Richview and subsequently removed to St. Charles,

where she had three sisters living, all now deceased. For the past twelve years she has made her home in Elgin, and is now eighty-eight years of age.

Mr. Harvey has ever been one of the popular and prominent citizens of the county, and in early life took quite an active and influential part in public affairs. In the fall of 1854 he was elected county treasurer, and two years later was made alderman of the third ward of Elgin, serving in that capacity for six years. Subsequently he filled the office of assessor of Elgin township for two terms. He also served as internal revenue assessor for Kane county two years. From 1860 until 1862, he lived on his farm, but in the latter year returned to Elgin, where he has since continued to reside. For sixty-two years he has been identified with the interests of the county, has seen almost its entire development, as on his arrival here the Indians were far more numerous than the white settlers and most of the land was still in its primitive condition. He is now the oldest member of Kane lodge, I. O. O. F., with which he has been connected since 1851. Although eighty-one years of age he is still well preserved. Nature deals kindly with the man who abuses not her laws, and although his business cares have been extensive age rests lightly upon him. It is safe to say that no man in Elgin has more or warmer friends than George P. Harvey.

THOMAS BISHOP, deceased, was a native of Devonshire, England, born September 12, 1820, and at the age of eight years accompanied his parents across the ocean to Canada, the family locating in Quebec, in the schools of which locality he

completed his education, which was begun in the mother country. After entering upon his business career he became interested in lumber and operated large tracts of forest land. He served as captain in the militia while in Quebec, and was a leading citizen of the community in which he made his home.

After his mother's death he and three brothers accompanied their father, Nathaniel Bishop, to Kane county, Illinois. The four sons secured work as farm hands, Thomas and one brother working on a farm on section 22, Elgin township, Henry and the other brother on a farm on section 28. After two years Thomas and William purchased a farm of two hundred and twenty-five acres, on which they had been employed, and Henry and his brother purchased the farm on section 28. In a few years two of the brothers went to Clinton, Illinois, and with the financial assistance of Thomas and Henry established themselves in the grain business, which they conducted with good success until their life labors were ended, winning a comfortable competence by their judicious management and untiring industry.

Immediately after becoming owner of the farm on section 22, Elgin township, Thomas Bishop began its further development and improvement and in 1856 erected the present commodious residence, which is one of the land marks of the neighborhood. He employed only common laborers to help him and laid the masonry, which is a fine specimen of cobble-stone range work, with his own hands. He also did the interior finishing and the home to-day stands as a monument of his thrift and enterprise. It has very substantial and thick walls like the edifices of the old countries, built to stand

for centuries. When he arrived in Kane county it was a wild and largely unsettled district. There was a stage road over the prairie and across his farm and all was open country. He hauled his produce to the Chicago market, finding there a little city just coming into prominence by reason of its shipping facilities. During the early years he also became an extensive stock trader, selling large numbers of cattle to the distillery companies and to the beef canning companies. He placed his land under a high state of cultivation until the well-tilled fields yielded to him a golden tribute and his farm became one of the best improved in the county. Neither was his attention given entirely to agricultural pursuits. He was a man of broad capability and made judicious investments in other business concerns which brought to him a handsome revenue. He was one of the organizers and stockholders of the Home National Bank, in which he served as a member of the directorate and was at one time a stockholder in the Elgin Canning Company. A man of strong personality he also took a leading part in local affairs and his influence and support were important factors in promoting the welfare of the community. He did efficient service in the interest of the public schools during his many years service as school director, and for about fourteen years he served as road commissioner, while for eight years he filled the office of supervisor, discharging all these duties with marked fidelity and promptness. He held membership in the Universalist church, and gave his political support to the men and measures of the Republican party.

Thomas Bishop was united in marriage to Miss Emma Stringer, who was born in Kane county, March 19, 1848, a daughter

of John A. and Ann (Sterricker) Stringer. Her father was born in Devonshire, England, July 20, 1807, and died June 17, 1895. He removed from England to Canada, at the age of fifteen years, resided for a time in New York, and in September, 1845, came to Kane county, where he acquired three hundred and forty acres of land on section 29, Elgin township. In early years he was a grain farmer, and later became largely interested in dairy farming. His parents were Richard and Hannah (Garbet) Stringer. The former died in Canada, about 1822, at the age of sixty years, and the latter attained the advanced age of ninety-four years. Mrs. Ann Stringer, mother of Mrs. Thomas Bishop, was born near London, England, June 7, 1816, and is now living in California with her daughter. She is still a well-preserved old lady, able to walk a number of miles, and took a long journey across the continent without great fatigue. Her parents were Rev. Thomas and Jane (Williams) Sterricker, the former a Methodist minister, who spent the greater part of his life in Cherry Valley, Otsego county, New York, where he died at the age of fifty-five years, while his wife passed away at the age of seventy-four.

By the marriage of Thomas Bishop and Emma Stringer were born six children: Clarence, of whom further mention is made in this sketch; Florence, his twin sister, who died at the age of six months; Frank, who died at the age of three months; Birdie, wife of A. M. Smythe, a jeweler, of Elgin; Wilbur and Walter, who are living in Elgin with their mother. The father of this family was called to the home beyond October 5, 1891, in his sixty-ninth year, and the community thereby lost one of its most valued citizens—a man whom to know was to honor. He was true to every trust reposed

in him, whether public or private; his honesty in all business transactions was above question; and he commanded the unqualified respect of those with whom he was brought in contact. He bore an important part in the work of development in Kane county, and his name will always be linked with those pioneers who laid the foundation for the present prosperity and advancement of this community.

CLARENCE BISHOP, the eldest son of Thomas and Emma Bishop, was born on the farm which is now his home, March 6, 1870. His elementary education, acquired in the district schools, was supplemented by study in the Elgin Academy and in Drew's Business College. At the age of eighteen years he put aside his text-books and became his father's able assistant on the farm, continuing his work with him until the father's death. He then operated the place for his mother until his marriage, in 1895, since which time he has leased the property from the estate. This is one of the best farms in the county, improved with large barns and outbuildings, supplied with a windmill connected with a well two hundred and sixty-five feet deep, which furnishes an inexhaustible supply of good water. There is also a mill and feed grinder and a twelve-horse power steam engine, and the fire appliances can throw a stream of water over any building on the farm. There is an ice-house with a capacity of one hundred tons, and thus upon his own place Mr. Bishop has all of the conveniences of city life. His land is sufficiently rolling to make good drainage, and is under a very high state of cultivation. He, however, raises hay and grain mostly for his stock, for he is a dairy farmer and keeps on hand from sixty to seventy head of high-grade cattle.

Mr. Bishop was united in marriage with Miss Emma L. Schumacher, a native of Pekin, Illinois, and a daughter of Rev. Henry Schumacher, who was born in Ohio, and died in Elgin April 25, 1885. He was a minister of the Evangelical church, and for twenty-five years was a member of the Illinois conference. His wife, whose maiden name was Susanna Klick, was a native of Pennsylvania, and now resides in Elgin.

Mr. Bishop is a member of the Universalist church, in which he has served as trustee for six years; gives his political support to the Republican party, and is an influential factor in the political circles in Kane county. He is now serving his second term as school trustee, is a member of the Lincoln Republican club, of Elgin, and has been a delegate to the state Republican convention in Springfield. He is a man of excellent business and executive ability, whose sound judgment, unflagging enterprise and capable management have brought to him a well-merited success. In manner he is pleasant and cordial, which, combined with his sterling worth, makes him one of the popular citizens of his native county.

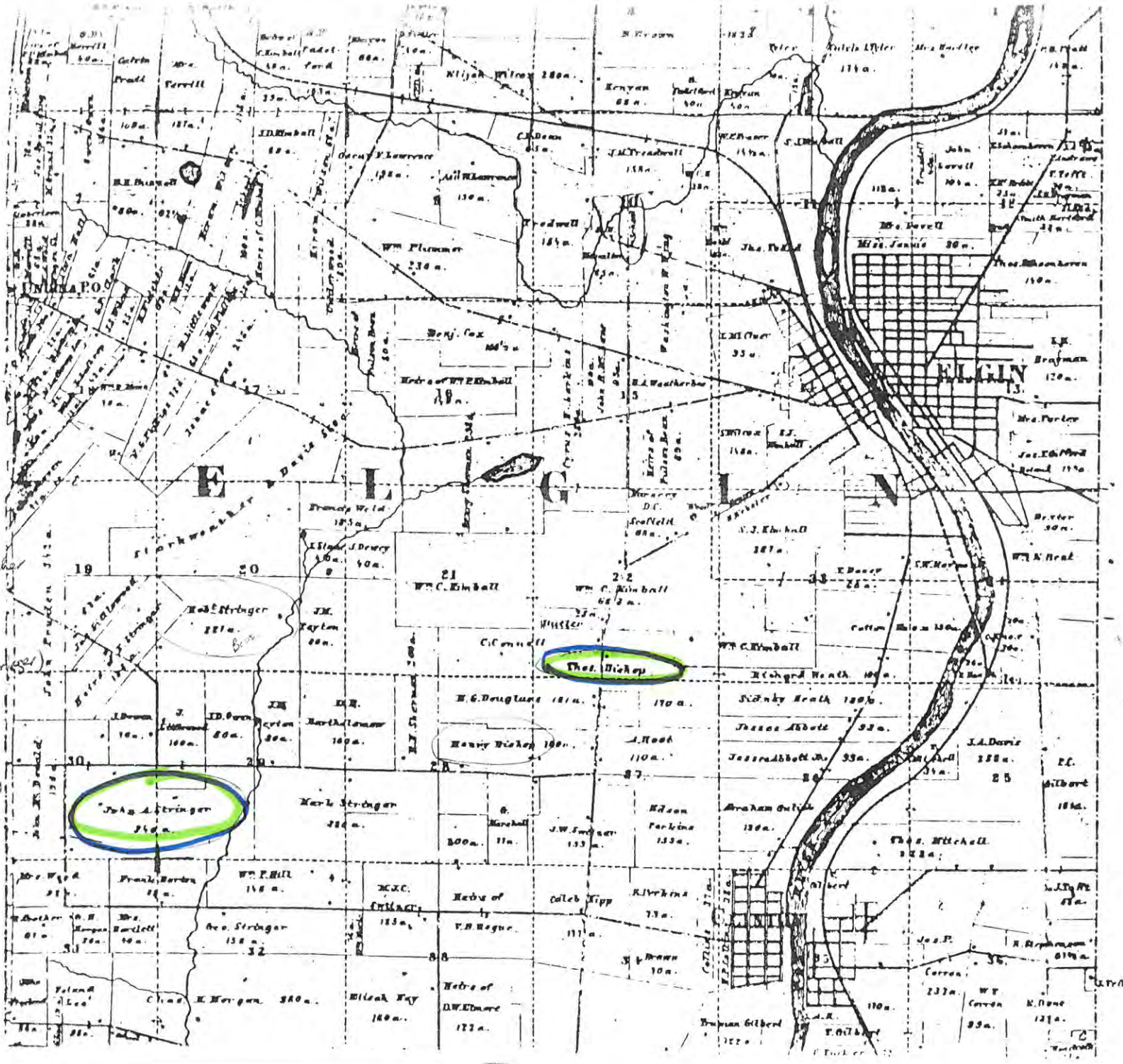
PROFESSOR MARVIN QUACKENBUSH, of Dundee, Illinois, is the efficient superintendent of public schools of Kane county, which position he has held since 1886. He is regarded as one of the best educators in the state, and as superintendent has but few equals. He is a native of New York, born in the town of Hatwick, Otsego county, November 25, 1842. His father, Abram Quackenbush, was also born in Otsego county in 1801, while his grandfather, James Quackenbush, was likewise a native of that state. The family were origi-

nally from Holland and settled in New York in the seventeenth century. Two brothers came from Holland about that time, one locating in Fort Orange, later called Albany, and the other in New York City. The branch of the family from which the Professor descended was that of the Albany brother. The name was originally spelled Quackenbos.

The paternal grandfather of our subject, James Quackenbush, was a soldier in the war of 1812, in which he held a commission. He settled in Otsego county, engaged in agriculture pursuits and there reared his family. Abram Quackenbush grew to manhood in that county, and in 1826 married Miss Delaney Wolf, also a native of New York, whose father was one of the early settlers of the Empire state and served in one of the old Indian wars. They were the parents of six children, as follows: Catherine, now the wife of Bradley Foss, of Laporte City, Iowa; Edward, a well educated man and a professional teacher for some years, and also a farmer, now living retired at Laporte City, Iowa; Maria, deceased; Adelia, now the wife of Rev. R. H. Wilkinson, a minister of the Methodist Episcopal church, now residing in Evanston, Illinois; Amelia, now the wife of Louis Dutton, of Chicago; and Marvin.

Abram Quackenbush was a farmer in Otsego county, New York, and there all his children were born. Desiring to give them better opportunities for advancement in life he determined to come west, and in 1850 they moved to Illinois, locating in Kane county, near the city of St. Charles, where he purchased a farm and engaged in agricultural pursuits. While yet a young man he learned the blacksmith trade, which occupation he followed in his native state in

It Was Not Unexpected.

THE SUDDEN DEATH OF THOMAS BISHOP

At His Home Near Elgin Monday Afternoon—He Passes Away in His Son's Arms—Assisted at the Milking a Few Seconds Before.

Thomas Bishop's death came just as he had wished—as he had occasionally expressed the desire. He passed away quickly and quietly. The tidings on Tuesday were very sudden, but he had suffered from heart disease for fourteen years, and the end was expected by himself and family. Five years ago next March he came, apparently, near death's door, but revived, and for two or three years enjoyed comparatively good health.

His fine home, two miles south-west of Elgin, in Elgin township, had been his residence for many years. Born in Devonshire, England, Sept. 16, 1822, he removed in early childhood with his parents to New Brunswick. In July, 1840, he came to Elgin, and settled on the farm whose location is known to many, from the hospitality and good cheer that always prevailed.

He was essentially a family man, a kind husband and indulgent father. He fully entered into all the pleasures of his children, and no social gathering at his home was complete without his active participation, even in his last years. He was as young in his feelings as the youngest. His family consists of his widow, whose maiden name was Stringer; Clarence, Birdie, Wilber, and Walter Bishop, all living at home. He was a member of the Universalist church, a director of the Home National bank since 1874, and had filled the position for years of highway commissioner, besides other offices. He was the last of four brothers, but has a sister, Mrs. Charles Stringer, living in Elgin.

For two or three days he had not felt as well as usual. At noon Monday he expressed an intimation that he would not live many days. When milking time came he went to the barn, and said he would help. Against the mild protest of his son he persisted, and again remarked that he would not be with him long. He milked two cows, and had poured out the milk, when Clarence noticed something was wrong with him. Clarence had just time to step to his father's assistance. The latter breathed his last at 4:30 o'clock in his son's arms.

The funeral was held at 1 p. m. Thursday at the residence. The burial was in the old, or Elgin, cemetery.

DEATH OF ROBERT M. IRELAND.

He Passes Away at the Hospital after a Long and Painful Illness.

Robert Morgan Ireland died at Sherman hospital at a few moments before 10 o'clock, Tuesday evening, of perforation of the bowels, caused by ulceration.

He was born on a farm in Claremont county, Ohio, where he resided with his parents until he was six years of age, when he was sent to Yonkers, New York, where he resided with an uncle for three years and attended school. In 1863 his parents removed to Macon county, Illinois, and Robert spent his days on the farm until he was 18 years of age. During his collegiate course he paid his expenses by selling publications to farmers. The occupation of book selling was distasteful to him but was able to make a profit of \$400-\$600 during the two summer months and on that amount he maintained himself during the year.
