## Historical/Architectural

In 1843 Philo Hatch bought the North East 1/4 of section 13, range 8, township 41 north, east of the 3rd Principal Meridian from the United States Government. He paid \$159.94 for the 160 acre section which included property north of Chicago Street, south of Summit Street, east of Dundee Avenue, and west of the Cook County line.

In the 1860's, John Webb had acquired a large piece of property within the section and subdivided it into blocks and lots, naming it "John Webb's Subdivision of Outlot 7." Some sort of change occurred in Webb's Subdivision in 1874 to make block 5 correspond with block 6 and thus was designated "Webb's 2nd Subdivision of Outlot 7." In 1874, Hill Street was just over a block long and stopped two lots north of Pearl Street. North Porter Street did not exist at that time. Once Division Street was opened from the west and extended to Hill Street in 1887 and Pearl Street was renamed Division Street around 1894, a continuous route from downtown Elgin to Liberty Street could be taken.

Blocks 5 and 6 of John Webb's Subdivision were laid out between Hill and Liberty, on the north and south sides of Pearl Street. In 1874, lot 5 in block 5 and another lot in block 6 were sold by Webb's widow, Mary Ann. In July 1882, James Baker bought lot 5 only. Baker is listed in the Elgin City Directory for 1884-5 at 418 Pearl Street. Baker was a carpenter. By 1885, Baker is no longer at 418 Pearl; he had sold the house to Thomas Matters in 1885. It seems logical that Baker built the house in the summer of 1882.

Matters is listed in the Elgin City Directory in 1885 at the Pearl Street address and when the address numbering system was realigned in 1894 along with streets renamed, he is next listed at 558 Division Street. Thomas Matters was a well digger and started his own business, Matters Tubular Wells Company. He apparently was successful because around 1902, he built the large brick house at 636 Park Street. Emma Matters, Thomas' wife, died of peritonitis at 558 Division Street in October 1899.

Matters warranted the house on Division Street to Melvin Jocelyn, a cashier at the Elgin National Bank in 1899, holding the mortgage until it was satisfied in 1901; Mr. Jocelyn then took possession of 558 Division Street. His daughter, Helen Jocelyn, was an English teacher at (old) Elgin High School for many years. The house stayed in the Jocelyn family until 1957. Several owners later, the house was acquired by the present owners.

## Architectural

558 Division Street is listed in the National Register of Historic Places Nomination of the Elgin Historic District as "contributing."

Italianate detail: The low pitched roof on the wide, front facing gable; the bay windows on the front and side of the house; the side bay has brackets at its eave line; 2/2 paned windows; the plainness of the house; paired windows on the side gabled section; a balance of windows to give a symmetrical look on both stories.

Queen Anne detail: the small diagonally paned windows in the roof peaks; the side gabled design; the partial wrap around porch with the recessed front door; vertical banding; the small rectangular stained glass in the middle window of the front bay.

The house is a delight of windows, possibly built with the idea of allowing lots of sunlight in from its southern exposure. The house is very pleasing to behold--it seems to be smiling!

## STARVE-TO-DEATH

Appointments Described—Old Way the  
Best.

"Starve-to-death" appointments was  
the term applied by Bishop S. M. Merrill  
at the Methodist preachers' meeting in  
Chicago Monday to those small congrega-  
tions which are too poor to support a  
pastor and still insist on having one. The  
bishop had been speaking of the trouble  
he had had with such charges, who de-  
mand a pastor and can raise only \$400  
or \$500 a year toward his support, and said  
he regretted the change from the old  
regime when a number of such con-  
gregations were willing to form a cir-  
cuit and in that way support among  
them strong preachers. He said:

"We are gradually losing the good old  
circuit system. When little congrega-  
tions demand preachers every Sunday  
we have had to give it to them in spite  
of the fact that they were unable to  
support the pastor. Because of this we  
have been obliged to crowd capable men  
into these 'starve-to-death' appoint-  
ments. A man who has spent years at  
college and has worked hard to fit him-  
self for the ministry expects and has a  
right to demand better support."

on the business committee, and Rev.  
Wm. Fawcett and Rev. C. E. Mandeville  
delegates to the social union.

## WON HER SUIT.

W. Clark Jewell is under arrest in Chi-  
cago and if he succeeds in freeing him-  
self there, he will have plenty of court  
business to attend to here in Elgin.

Mr. Jewell and his father, G. W. Jewell,  
were in Elgin some weeks this  
fall working up a county history and  
advertising scheme. They interviewed  
many business men and succeeded in  
arousing some interest in their plan,  
although they did not meet with that  
encouragement which they hoped for  
financially.

They resided at the Merchants' hotel  
and after being here a few weeks, the  
younger man married Mrs. Storm, di-  
vorced wife of August Storm.

Tuesday Geo. F. Sills heard of Jewell's  
whereabouts through the arrest in Chi-  
cago and he at once swore out a war-  
rant for him, charging him with stealing  
a seven-mile railroad ticket. Constable  
Plumleigh went to Chicago Tues-  
day evening to arrest Jewell.

C. Henry Fosgate, proprietor of the  
Merchants' hotel, has also sworn out a  
warrant for the Jewells, charging them  
with beating a hotel keeper. They  
owed about \$50 at the Merchants'.

It is said an attorney is anxious to  
find Jewell to have him brought to ac-  
count for selling the mortgaged furni-  
ture of Mrs. Jewell, formerly Mrs.  
Storm.

Constable Plumleigh brought the  
Jewells to Elgin Wednesday afternoon.  
Before Justice Hubbard the Jewells were  
held under \$200 bonds on Mr. Sills  
charge, and in Justice Young's court  
both prisoners were bound over under  
\$300 bonds for defrauding a hotel keeper.

Mrs. Jewell accompanied them out  
from Chicago.


