This lot was addressed as 159 Ashland Avenue prior to 1894, which became 471 after the City of Elgin reorganized the streets and numbering system. This lot was sold as unimproved property based on the cost of \$400 by Richard and Mary Murray to William S. Hewins Jr. on April 15, 1889. William and his wife Mary Jane built this house shortly thereafter, as evidenced by the 1889-1890 City Directory of the City of Elgin. William jr. worked at the Elgin National Watch Factory, as did his father, William sr. In newspaper articles, William sr. is referred to as the owner of the house, but based on the deeds, the home was in the name of his son and daughter-in-law. William sr. was born in Coventry, England in 1841 and served a a seven year apprenticeship at a chronometer and watch manufacturer there. He came to the United States in 1869 and was the foreman of the U. S. Watch factory in Marian, New Jersey. He then worked at Tiffany and company in New York City. From 1873 to 1875 he worked at the Waltham Watch factory in Lancaster, Pennsylvania and came to Elgin in 1876 to work at the Elgin National Watch Company as foreman in the gilding room.

On September 21, 1892, William jr. and his wife Mary Jane sold this home and lot to Carl Peter Carlson and moved to 570 Prospect Boulevard and in 1902, the family moved back to England. They sold the house on Prospect to the Catholic Church and it became the first St. Joseph's Hospital.

Carl Peter Carlson, also known as Charles and C. P., and his wife Helena moved to this house in 1892. His occupation is listed as "capitalist" which indicates he lived off his investments. In 1900, the family consisted of Carl and Helena and four of their six children: Emma, Hilda, and Aaron, who all worked at the Elgin National Watch Company, and Amanda who was not employed outside the house. In 1910, Helena died and later the same year, Emma married Charles Linder, who had been a roomer in the home for several years. Emma and Charles inherited the house on the death of her father and remained in the house until Emma died on November 5, 1957.

Delayed news of the death of William S. Hewins, who was at one time foreman of the gilding department of the Elgin watch factory, has been received by Elgin friends. Mr. Hewins became foreman of the gilding room in 1876 and remained until 1902 when he returned to his native city of Coventry, England, where he died on No-

He was 73 years of age and had

been employed in many watch factor-

ies. He served seven years' apprenticeship with James Haddell & Co., manufacturers of chronometers and watches and after working eight years in Birmingham came to America to work in the Marion, N. J., watch factory. He was with Tiffany in New York and spent two years with the Waltham company and a year at Lancaster, Pa., before coming to Elgin. After leaving Elgin he was for a short time foreman of gilding room of the Prescott, Eng., factory, but retired on account of poor health.

#### WENT TO SASKATCHEWAN CANADA AS HOMESTEADER

Eigin Resident Tells His Experience in New Country; Owns Quarter Section of Land.

Frank Clark, 302 Hastings street, the only one who stuck out of a party of Elginites who took up homestead claims in Saskatchewar, Canada, in 1904, is back home.

# WILLIAM HEWINS, PORMER GILDING FOREMAN, IS DEAD

EDC, De, 16, 1913

Word Received from England Telling of His Death at Coventry, His Home Since Leaving Elgin Factory.

## APPROACH OF BLINDNESS CAUSED BROKEN HEART

Master of Monitor Lodge,

A. F. and A. M.

Word was received in Elgin yesterday of the death of William Smith Hewins, former foreman of the gilding room of the watch factory, at Coventry, England, November 9.

Mr. Hewins was 73 years old. Deathywas due to a general breaking flown. The final decline started a fear ago, when a specialist told Mr. Hewins that he was going blind. That thought caused him to lose all interest in life and he is said to have watched for the lend with a broken heart.

#### Educated in England.

Mr. Hewins was born in Coventry October 11, 1841. He was educated in Fairfax's Charity school and the Coventry School of Art, and served a seven years' apprenticeship with James Haddell and company, chronometer and watch manufacturers at Coventry. He worked for eight years in Birmingham, England, and came to America in 1869, becoming foreman of the U.S. Watch factory at Marion, N. J.

In 1871 Mr. Hewins was in partnership with F. Wilmot, 5 Maiden Lane, New York City, and afterwards was with Tiffany and company lin the same city. He was at Waltham from 1873 to 1875, at Lanca ter, Pa, Infactory the same year and becoming foreman of the gilding room.

In August, 1902; Mr. Hewins left Eigin and returned to Coventry, Lating he went to Prescott, England, and was foreman of the gilding room of the watch factory there, but was forced to retire on account of ill health. His health was failing when he left Elgin and he was given ten years to live by a physician here.

#### Old Homostead, Hospital Site.

Mr. Hewins, old homestead is the site of St. Joseph's hospital. He sold it to the Sisters and purchased preperty in Raymond street, near Bent, which he disposed of when he left Elgin. He is said to have been well to do financially.

On leaving Elgin, he was given a life membership in Monitor lodge, A. F. and A. M., and was a past master of the lodge. He was a member of Bethel commandery and was a past emittent commander. He belonged also to Royal L. Munn chapter, Reyal Arch Masons, and to the Ancient Order of United Workmen.
