356 Orchard Original home built in 1881 for Jacob and Margaretha Schmidt was a ubiquitous Italianate home with a front stoop and side porches (these details are visible through the paste-over of the 1953 Sanborn map when a strong light is held behind it. The Schmidts sold the house to Catherine Wendler, a widow whose husband's death is included in the documentation. She later married Carl or Charles Odebrecht, a stone or brick mason. Included in the documentation is a mortgage for a home improvement loan dated 1934. The porches and stoop were removed, the building veneered in brick and a one and one half story addition was put on the North elevation, providing a new entrance. The new style is Tudor.

322 Perry Additi9onal notes: George and Mary Lord donated the land for this house to the church (first to the First German Methodist Episcopal Church then amended to the Zion German Methodist Episcopal Church). The church later took the name Wesley United Methodist Church.

The house is Queen Anne in style. No significant alterations.



Gable Front Bungalows, that is, those with front-facing gable roofs, are a common subtype in the survey area. Generally modest in styling and proportion, none of these was ranked significant. The Bungalow at 424 S. 424 S. State St. State St., however, makes a good illustration of this subtype. It has a recessed front entry porch under pointed arched openings. There are prominent cornice returns and threeover-one and four-over-one doublehung windows.

Another common subtype is Bungalows with side-facing gable roofs, typically punctuated with front dormers. An excellent example is the Ole and Gorine Steen house at 425 Billings St. Ole Steen was also an employee of the Watch Company. This 425 Billings St.

are double wood columns and sidelights alongside the front door. Once again, three-over-one windows are present.

Also classified as Craftsman Bungalows are those houses with a front-facing gable roof and a projecting front porch, also with gable roof. A fine illustration of this subtype is at 517 Ashland Ave. Built c. 1915, the projecting front porch is offset. Both the main roof and the

c. 1911 frame structure has a side gable roof that extends like a catslide roof over the front porch. The front of the house is dominated by a front gable dormer over the wide front porch. Original clapboard and wood shingle siding remain in place. The porch and stair railings are not historic.

A later version of a side-gable Bungalow, built c. 1927, is the Arthur M. and Lillie B. Van Buren house at 509 Hendee St. This low, one-story

house has a prominent front entry porch with front gable and round arched openings. The

house is covered in wood shingle and has three-over-one double-hung windows. Mr. Van Buren was a Watch Company employee.


A very common Bungalow subtype has a hipped roof. In the survey area these are usually found with hipped roof dormers, although other roof types on the dormers are present. Most of the hipped roof Bungalows are frame, but there are also some in stucco and some in brick.






